

Rod's wife, Sandy, president of the Debutante Committee, also welcomed the crowd and said of the Deb Program, "Youth serving youth best describes our philosophy."
Proceeds from the ball and other debutante events held throughout the year benefit youth orchestra programs.

This year's debs included three students from Manatee High School: Christine and Diane Moseley, escorted by their father Tom Moseley; and Anne Marie Whiteside, escorted by her dad, Jack Whiteside. 
